HOLY LEISURE

I used to visit my sister every August when she lived with her family in New Orleans. I loved walking the French Quarter, ordering a Sazerac with my muffaletta po-boy, riding the street car up and down St. Charles Avenue, going to the Audubon Zoo with my nieces, but what I relished above all was taking it slowly. It was easy in the Big Easy. You really couldn't do anything else, it was so wickedly hot and humid, but New Orleanians showed you how. No one in New Orleans was ever in a hurry.

New Yorkers could probably learn a thing or two from them. We are probably too busy for our own good. So wrapped up in work, so over-scheduled by our family activities, so booked-up even on vacation, that we hardly have any time to take our time.

"We work so we can have leisure," says Aristotle in his *Nicomachean Ethics*. Leisure was understood by the philosopher to include those activities we pursue *after* we have taken care of the business of providing food, shelter, and clothing for ourselves. Leisure has little, if anything to do with the practical needs of our day but rather to the needs of the heart. ("Man does not live by bread alone," Jesus said when tempted by the devil, "but by the Word of God.") According to him, leisure is that which engages the spirit or soul - particularly through philosophy and religion - because it affords the human person the opportunity to discover the meaningful and thus the a deeper understanding of our work and pursuits.

Joseph Pieper, writing in *Only the Lover Sings: Art and Contemplation*, explains that what is meaningful in our lives can only be truly uncovered if 1) there is "an attitude of receptive openness and attentive silence, and 2) "the ability to celebrate a feast." (*Only the Lover Sings*, San Francisco: Ignatius Press, 1990, p. 25-26). The first reminds us that "the truly great and uplifting things in life" are not by our own effort but often come from experiences without. The second is from an acceptance of truth: truth about who we are, and where we have come from, and ultimately where we are going. We can only celebrate the latter if we have something we can be really happy about.

Thus, our weekly remembrance of the Resurrection. "The Sabbath was made for Man, not Man for the Sabbath," Jesus said. Hardly

an *obligation* for the maintenances of our daily life, these moments of holy leisure, along with the time we set aside each day for prayerful conversation with the Lord, give us the wherewithal to make sure the other days are not the "same old, same old." To celebrate the Mass on Sunday so that it makes a difference in our lives requires adopting "that attitude of receptive openness and attentive silence most characteristic of prayer." Not making a distinction between Mass and everything else that demands our attention turns it into just another activity.

Pieper warns that when we lose the attitudes necessary for true leisure, "all endeavors to organize 'relaxation' turn into an even more hectic, indeed an outright desperate, form of work." (*Only the Lover Sings*, p. 27) That's no way to enjoy Mass. This summer, naturally a time of relief, gives us a nice opportunity to slow down and take it easy, and really enjoy our time with the Lord.

Sr. Pauline Chirchirillo (Sr. Mary Olivia) of the Sisters of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, entered into eternal rest on Tuesday, June 21, 2016. She was 87 years old.

Sr. Pauline entered Religious Life at Mt. Saint Joseph, New Windsor on February 2, 1948 and made final vows on August 16, 1953. Sister earned a BS in Education and an MS in Religious Education from Fordham University. During her ministry, Sr. Pauline taught in several catholic schools and served as a pastoral assistant and children's caseworker.

Sister joined the Propagation of the Faith ministry in 1991 and became the Director in 2004 enabling her to travel to many missions around the world.
