

NAMING A PARISH: MY TWO-CENTS

One might call this "pastor's prerogative" but I thought it important as well to give some example on how we all might give some thought to the naming of our newly formed parish. My nomination for the new parish name:

Saint Marianne Cope

(The following is excerpted from various sources on the internet.)

Baptized Maria Anna Barbara Koob on January 23, 1838 in Germany, Maria Cope (whose family Anglicized their name) emigrated one year later with her family to the United States, settling in Utica, New York, where they became members of the **Parish of St. Joseph**. She attended the parish school there but as the oldest child in the family had to leave to help support her family in a local textile factory. (Her father, who was naturalized along with the whole family, became an invalid.)

After her father's death and once her sisters and brothers were grown, she felt drawn to a vocation in the consecrated life and entered the Sisters of the Third Order Regular of Saint Francis in Syracuse, New York. With the religious habit, she took the new name Marianne and began first as a teacher and then a principal of several new schools started to provide education to newly arrived German immigrants. Later, she helped found the first two Catholic hospitals in central New York, providing medical care for all with no regard to race or creed. She administered the first public hospital in Syracuse, and had a role in establishing a college of medicine that later became the school of medicine at Syracuse University.

In 1883, as Superior General of her order, she received a plea from King Kalakaua of Hawaii and the local bishop to help care for the many islanders and colonists who were victims of an epidemic of leprosy. At the time, Father (now Saint) Damien de Veusster had set up a mission for the lepers who had been exiled to the island of Molokai and received world-wide attention (including Robert Louis Stevenson who wrote a passionate letter about the work of Fr. Damien). When Mother Marianne received the request, more than fifty other religious institutes had already declined to help. Mother Marianne wrote:

I am hungry for the work and I wish with all my heart to be one of the chosen ones, whose privilege it will be, to sacrifice themselves for the salvation of the poor Islanders... I am not afraid of any disease, hence it would be my greatest delight even to minister to the abandoned 'lepers.'

Six other Sisters joined her (many more applied) and Mother spoke confidently that not one would suffer the illness (they never did). Upon arrival at Maui,

Mother Marianne and her sisters set up the Malulani Hospital for victims of leprosy as well as a home for homeless girls who were children of leprosy patients. A short time later, in 1888, she and her sisters moved to Kalaupapa, the leper community on the island of Molokai where Father Damien was in the last months of his life having become a leper himself. She cared for the orphan boys in the colony and for the girls and women who had been deported there. She died on August 9, 1918 of natural causes after thirty-five years of service to the leprous sick. Mother Marianne was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI.

Some personal notes: I have been a great admirer of Saint Marianne as a result of a devotion to Father Damien (whose canonization by Pope Benedict I attended). Many professional women of this day (and men!) should marvel at what she accomplished at the time but her desire to serve Christ present in the leprous men, women and children of a land far away from where she was born and where she grew up proclaims the greater love that no man has. She was a New Yorker and may have sailed up and down the Hudson passing by Cornwall! A few months ago, I told Cardinal Dolan I was going to try to convince you all to give serious consideration to asking that our parish be named for her and he confided his hope that one of us would perhaps become the first parish named for her. I suggest her as our new patroness and I do so with conviction.
