HOW'S YOUR LENT?

By now, each of us should have decided upon the shape of our Lenten "program." After a well-spent season of Lent, we should expect reasonably something of a transformation. The season of Lent lasts long enough for us to make a habit out of practices of reverence and faith that can last a lifetime. Unlike our customary New Year's resolutions, made on one day after a busy month of overspending and overindulging, a good Lent requires foresight and commitment.

In "olden days," the three Sunday prior to Ash Wednesday, named Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima (for the *seventeen*, the *sixtieth*, and the *fiftieth* day before Easter) served as a kind of prelude to help the Church prepare for Lent and Passiontide (Holy Week). According to Dr. Pius Parsch, the Gospels read on these Sundays set out for us an invitation, a task, and a goal. The invitation: God's vineyard. The task: the work of the divine Sower to cultivate the fields of his Church and the soul to produce a harvest thirty, sixty or a hundred-fold. The goal: the light of faith at Easter. Since these weeks prior to Lent & Easter were meant originally to prepare the catechumens (*the unbaptized seeking Baptism*) for their incorporation into the Body of Christ through Baptism, First Communion, and Confirmation, they were never treated casually: the decision to accept the invitation from God was a serious commitment. Just so, these weeks in the Church's later history took on the character of reminding and encouraging the Faithful that the approaching weeks were an important season of grace. How ironic that this practice of a pre-Lent was abandoned in 1969 when it might have been helpful, at a time when ignorance of the faith and poor catechesis became epidemic.

Whatever the changes made in the liturgy and the liturgical year since, the lesson of Lent's possibilities and its seriousness still presents for us an invitation, a task, and a goal. The invitation: ever greater communion with God through the mysteries we celebrate. The task: to turn away from sin and anything that prevents us from an encounter with the invisibly present. The goal: a more saintly and therefore, blessed life, and the promise that we will be better for it!
