### **SAINT ANSELM: April 21<sup>st</sup>**

A native of Aosta, Italy, Anselm desired to enter the Benedictines at the age of fifteen. His father's strong opposition kept him from the monastery until he was twenty-seven. Only three years later he was made abbot. He led his brothers at Bec in Normandy until he went to Canterbury, England, where he was elected archbishop. An able statesman in a time of tense Church-State relations. Anselm was at heart a monk. During times of exile, he gave himself to prayer and study. His motto, "Faith seeking understanding", demonstrates how he did philosophy: on his knees. He died in 1109 and was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1720.

## **WHY BELIEVE IN THE RESURRECTION**

### **(Part 2)**

“Why can’t you believe in reincarnation and still be a Catholic?” the teenager asked me. The idea caught me off-guard. It was not that someone growing up in a modern Western society might believe in reincarnation, but that someone would try to associate a faith that believes in Resurrection with the idea that we are re-born perpetually. I asked her why it was she “believed” in reincarnation. She felt, she said, that “getting it right” – that is, getting life right – did not seem possible for one lifetime alone, but needed many lifetimes.

She confessed she knew little of how reincarnation was understood in say, Buddhism or Hinduism. The former is more of a philosophy than a religious while the latter is historically a composite of many religions. I told her that these systems of belief held a person’s life after death to be determined by *karma* or what they did in this and past lives. If our *karma* is good, we return in a higher state of existence, as someone more enlightened; if our *karma* is bad, our destiny for the next life could be as a lower creature, i.e., any kind of animal, insect, etc., or at best returned to the same existence we had before. To my understanding, good karma leads to *nirvana* or enlightenment, a kind of existence that makes other realities apart from the self, including both joy and suffering, irrelevant. (Maybe this is why the historical Buddha is often depicted with his eyes closed.) The thesis then is that reincarnation is all about *my* peace, *my* personal contentment, and not yours.

Herein the problem with this kind of thinking: ultimately focused on self, reincarnation says our relations and loves are unimportant. Howsoever one returns, the reincarnated man or woman has no perduring connection to those we love or any joy experienced previously. In truth, reincarnation means that all our relationships in this life are not even a distant memory. There is no joy in reunion, no hope of a life lived together forever. There is only the pain of separation which is inevitable and permanent. Indeed, our sufferings, often the sign of the greater loves in life, are rendered meaningless in the end.

However, here is what I heard the teenager really saying when she said she thought it would take several lifetimes to get it right: it suggested a fascination, a joy, a love for the blessings that God gives us in this life and a desire not to take one moment for granted. Malcolm Muggeridge wrote of

how death’s nearness often “makes what is left behind - the earth itself, its shapes and smells and colors and creatures, all that one has known and loved and lived with - the more entrancing...” “One casts,” he wrote, “a backward look at the old place, overcome with affection for it, almost to the point of tears.” (*Confessions of a Twentieth-Century Pilgrim*)

Christian faith is centered upon the news that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. In the second Preface prayer for the Easter season, we pray “Through [Christ our Passover] the children of light rise to eternal life and the halls of the heavenly Kingdom are thrown open to the faithful; his Death is our ransom from death, and in his rising the life of all has risen.” These words remind us that God really does care about “every hair on our head”. Not only is our eternal destiny so important that He would give his only begotten Son over to death on a cross, but so also the gift of each and every love - for our brothers and sisters and for creation itself - we are blessed with in this life.

She had to admit, after we finished talking, that if you really think about it, only the Resurrection makes sense to the human heart.

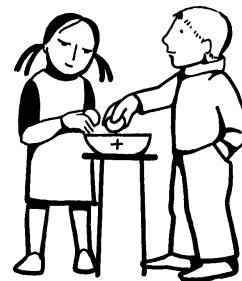

### **SAINT ADALBERT: April 23<sup>rd</sup>**

Adalbert of Prague, Bohemia (Modern Czech Republic), spent his life serving the various peoples of Eastern Europe: the Hungarians, the Slavs, and the Prussians. He was made bishop of Prague, but was forced out of his see and entered a monastery. His prayer bore fruit in renewed missionary efforts to the peoples of Poland and Prussia. He was murdered in 997 while preaching near the Baltic. “You had it always in your mouth that it was your desire to die for

Christ," confessed one of the pagan priests as the death wound was dealt to the bishop. Adalbert's tomb in Gnesen, Poland, has been the site of historical meetings of popes and princes.
