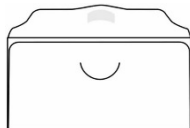

## **WHY BELIEVE IN THE RESURRECTION – PART 2**

*On this 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the loss of 2,996 sisters and brothers in the attacks on our nation in 2001, and remembering all those emergency responders who through their self-sacrifice endured sickness and death in the rescue efforts, the light of the Resurrection makes it possible to have genuine hope in a world corrupted by sin.*

“Can you believe in reincarnation and still be a Catholic?” the young woman asked. The idea took me by surprise: not that someone growing up in a modern Western society might believe in reincarnation, but that someone should be looking for some association between a faith that believes in the Resurrection and the notion that we are re-born continually. I asked her why it was she “believed” in reincarnation; her response was a good one. She felt that “getting it (life) right” was not possible for one lifetime only, but needed many. By her own admission, she knew little of how Buddhism and Hinduism understand reincarnation. For each - one a philosophy, the other a composite of many religions – a person’s life after death is determined by *kharma* or what they do in this life. If their *kharma* is good, the return to a higher state of existence, as someone more enlightened; if their *kharma* is bad, their destiny for the next life is as a lower creature, any kind of animal, insect, etc. Ultimately, the goal in Buddhism is to realize *nirvana*, which is a kind of existence that denies other realities apart from the self. (Notice how the Buddha, an “enlightened” and by the way, historical man, is often depicted with his eyes closed.) Reincarnation is in the end about my peace, about my personal contentment.

Herein the problem with this kind of thinking: ultimately focused on self, our relations and loves become irrelevant. However, the reincarnated man or woman returns, it is never with reference to those we love. In truth, the idea of reincarnation renders all our relationships in this life as not even a distant memory. There is no joy in reunion, no hope of a life lived together forever without the pain of separation. Separation is inevitable and permanent.

The young woman was not completely off the track. Her sense of getting life right spoke of a love for the blessings which God gives us in this life and a desire to not take any moment for granted. Malcolm Muggeridge wrote of how death’s nearness often

“makes what is left behind - the earth itself, its shapes and smells and colours and creatures, all that one has known and loved and lived with - the more entrancing.... One casts a backward look at the old place, overcome with affection for it, almost to the point of tears.” (*Confessions of a Twentieth-Century Pilgrim*)

Christian faith is centered upon the news that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. In the second Preface prayer for Mass during the Easter season, we pray “He has made us children of the light, rising to new and everlasting life... His death is our ransom from death; his resurrection is our rising to life.” This core belief is essential to our faith because it confirms for us that God really does care about “every hair on our head”. Not only is our eternal destiny so important that He would give his only begotten Son over to death on a cross, but so are the gift of the loves He gives us in this life. At the end of the day, only the Resurrection makes sense to the human heart.

## **FLOOD RELIEF**

There will be a second collection on September 17<sup>th</sup> & 18<sup>th</sup> for flood relief in Baton Rouge, LA. There are over 40 families who are homeless and without cars in Saint Francis Xavier Parish.



Pastor, Rev. Edward Chiffrieller, S.S.J. will use the money collected to assist these families. He will interview each family and then write checks to Sears, Home Depot, etc., or give them gift cards to the stores. He is very experienced at this since he was involved with parishes in New Orleans after Katrina. Thank you for whatever you can do to assist them.
