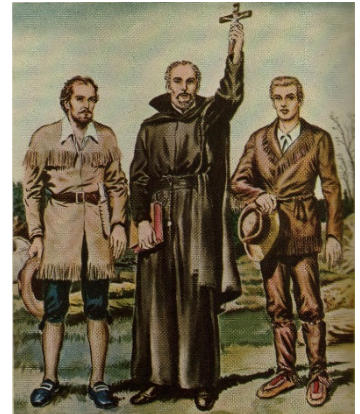
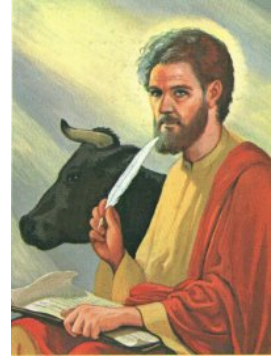

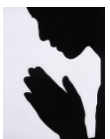


NEWS ABOUT FATHER BOB PHELPS

A GOOD AND PERFECT GIFT

October is celebrated traditionally as Respect Life month in Catholics churches around the United States. American Catholics are asked to renew their personal commitment to defend all life. "Faith," Pope Benedict XVI once said, "opens our eyes to human life in all its grandeur and beauty." Through prayer and education, action and witness, Catholics are encouraged to do all they can to help our nation foster a *culture of life*.

Recent studies in the U.S. indicate that, since the 1973 Supreme Court Decision that allowed unrestricted abortion, 84% to 91% of unborn children diagnosed prenatally with Down syndrome have been killed through abortion. A friend of mine shared the email she received below from the mother of a Down syndrome child following their book club discussion of A Good and Perfect Gift: Faith, Expectations, and a little girl named Penny by Amy Julie Becker.

Dear M.E.

Please thank Deacon for picking the book and thanks to all for letting me share my joy of being Michael's mom! I don't generally talk about my kids, as I would see it as bragging, but I can't help sharing about Michael because it is just so counter to what I thought it would be and know that it is all thanks to God's doing. If God had given me a choice to have a child with Ds (Down syndrome) or choose one without, I could have talked my way out of a paper bag as to why I could not be a good parent to a child with Ds; I'm not organized enough, I could not be an advocate, I have 4 others to take care of, I have no family here, my husband travels every week, etc. Ridiculous sounding, actually, but now I don't worry that anyone would feel sorry for me, rather I worry that people could actually be jealous of me because Michael is my son! Laugh out loud, silly, I know, and trust me I have no desire to make anyone jealous!, but it is just a reflection of how grateful I am and how blessed I feel! Looking forward to gathering again. The following poem was given to my husband by Fr. Pat the Sunday after Michael Theodore's birth. He had read this poem during his homily the previous Sunday. Shortly after Michael's birth, Fr. Pat reached into his pocket and handed Dan a copy of this poem and said, "I think you asked for this." Shocked, Dan replied, "I didn't ask for it, but I do need it."

*God is certainly quite present in all of our lives! May you feel his blessings today and always!

SAINT JOHN PAUL II

A native of Wadowice, Poland, Karol Wojtyla suffered the loss of his mother as a child, and lived under two repressive regimes before being elected Pope John Paul II in 1978. He devoted himself to interpreting the Second Vatican Council and preparing the Church for the new millennium. After surviving an assassination attempt in 1981, John Paul offered his attacker forgiveness. He suffered a slow decline from Parkinson's disease on the

world stage. Despite his frail frame and slurred speech, he continued to travel and teach. John Paul died on April 22, 2005, on the vigil of the feast he had inaugurated, Divine Mercy Sunday.
