before ordination in June of 2018. Please continue your prayers and support for John and his wife, Laurie.

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

**EXACTLY AS IT SHOULD BE**

God never leaves anything to chance. In pondering the mystery of the God-among-us (*Emmanuel*) in the Word made flesh at Christmastime, we should not find the setting in which He chose to live surprising: to be like us in every way but sin means to become a member of a human family. Yet neither should we take this necessity for granted. The stories about the birth of Jesus that St. Matthew and St. Luke give us in the gospels tell us that God had everything planned out. The angel Gabriel was adamant that God wanted Mary to give birth to His Son. Joseph would serve as his earthly father and guardian, giving him the name Jesus. According to Micah (chapter 5, verse 1) Bethlehem was the place where he would be born (what the Magi were told!). There would be danger - because the child was a threat to the power and wealth of those who called themselves kings - and exile to a foreign land, but God would take care of that. Afterwards, they would live a life of obscurity in humble circumstances as other families do. God wished that salvation should rest in the heart of the family and, apart from any sentimentality, that this should mean something to us.

In *Familiaris Consortio*, St. John Paul II wrote: "the Christian family constitutes a specific revelation and realization of ecclesial communion." What this means is that in the human family God reveals his very presence to us and for that reason, the family can be described as "a domestic church." A community of faith, hope, and charity, the family is a *privileged* community, (from *The Catechism of the Catholic Church*) a sign and image of the Father and the Son in the Holy Spirit... called to partake of the prayer and sacrifice of Christ.... The Christian family has an evangelizing and missionary task." In other words, like the Holy Family, every human family is central to the salvation and redemption of all creation!

More than any other institution, the modern family has been beset by profound and rapid changes in society and culture. Poverty and war, and all the ills of our world have always been a challenge to sustaining the communion of love that characterizes family life. Yet, both the wood of the manger and the wood of the Cross tell us that in conquering sin and death, the only real threats to love, the loves of family and friends reclaim their eternal value. The late attempts to redefine the human family cannot promise that.

Christmas, of course, is a special day for families. Our feast celebrates the great mystery through which God made us part of His family. We might set our hearts and minds, perhaps, on allowing our families to become what God wants them to be, modeling them on the Holy Family and trying to live in His Presence. Going to Mass, praying together (especially the Rosary) and the reading scripture should be as natural to every family as gathering for meals or going on vacations together.

*On behalf of our clergy and staff, I extend our prayers and blessings to you, the parish family of St. Thomas and St. Joseph, for a holy and joy-filled Christmas.*

**GUIDELINES FOR RECEIVING COMMUNION**

**For Catholics:** We fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

**For fellow Christians:** We welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist as our brothers and sisters. We pray that our common baptism and the action of the Holy Spirit in this Eucharist will draw us closer to one another and begin to dispel the sad divisions which separate us. We pray that these will lessen and finally disappear, in keeping with Christ's prayer for us "that they may all be one" (Jn 17:21). Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion

**For non-Christians:** We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and the unity of the human family.
