THE CONVERSION OF SAINT PAUL

"Being converted is simply meeting yourself for the purpose of going to the very end of your being. Conversion means a willingness to see the truth of things and conform one's conduct to it" (A. Sertillanges). In the voice and light that Saul encounters on the road, he sees the truth of things and willingly conforms himself to Jesus Christ. "That dear preacher Paul...was a wolf, but he became a lamb, a gracious vessel of love - and the fire with

which Christ filled his vessel he carried through the whole world" (Saint Catherine of Siena). It is clear that Paul wholly fled from himself and cast out all his own will, and that his will was active only in relation to Christ. Since with Christ there was nothing undesirable or repugnant to his will, it follows that his was a wondrous pleasure which was always present and with which he always lived" (N. Cabasilas).

THE RESURRECTION. CONTRADICTED?

Monday this week has been designated by the Bishops of the United States as a day of prayer for the legal protection of unborn children and an invitation to all the faithful to undertake acts of penance to obtain forgiveness for our nation and for all who bear some responsibility for these sins against the sanctity of life. We pray for mothers who have been victimized by our "culture of death," for fathers who did not support mothers of their children by guarding the new lives of their unborn child, for doctors and nurses who have allowed themselves to become desensitized to the inherent goodness of life, to elected officials who through lack of courage have failed in their duty to promote the true common good.

This Sunday afternoon, at 3:00 pm we will have a special holy hour with exposition and benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at St. Thomas Church and prayers that our nation will become a land of true peace for all, respecting the unalienable right to life endowed by our Creator. Our Masses on Monday, the 8:30 am at St. Thomas and the 6:30 pm at St. Joseph will celebrate the Liturgy for Giving Thanks to God for the Gift of Human Life. We will have our usual holy hour for adoration at St. Joseph Church on Monday at 5:30 pm for prayer.

Below, some reflections from our bishops:

- Some Catholic elected officials have adopted the argument that, while they personally oppose evils like abortion, they cannot force their religious views onto the wider society. This is seriously mistaken on several key counts. First, regarding abortion, the point when human life begins is not a religious belief but a scientific fact – a fact on which there is clear agreement even among leading abortion advocates. Second, the sanctity of human life is not merely Catholic doctrine but part of humanity's global ethical heritage, and our nation's founding principle. Finally, democracy is not served by silence. Most Americans would recognize the contradiction in the statement, "While I am personally opposed to slavery or racism or sexism I cannot force my personal view on the rest of society." *Real pluralism depends on people of conviction*

*struggling vigorously to advance their beliefs by every ethical and legal means at their disposal" (US Bishops, *Living the Gospel of Life*, 1998, n. 24).*

- American Catholics have long sought to assimilate into U.S. cultural life. But in assimilating, we have too often been digested. We have been changed by our culture too much, and we have changed it not enough. If we are leaven, we must bring to our culture the whole Gospel, which is a Gospel of life and joy. That is our vocation as believers. And there is no better place to start than promoting the beauty and sanctity of human life" (US Bishops, *Living the Gospel of Life*, 1998, n. 25).
- The Catholic community is large and diverse. We are Republicans, Democrats, and Independents. We are members of every race, come from every ethnic background, and live in urban, rural, and suburban communities in all fifty states. We are CEOs and migrant farm workers, senators and persons on public assistance, business owners and union members. But all Catholics are called to a common commitment to protect human life and stand with those who are poor and vulnerable. We are all called to provide a moral leaven for our democracy, to be the salt of the earth."
- The Catholic community's participation in public affairs does not undermine, but enriches the political process and affirms genuine pluralism. Leaders of the Church have the right and duty to share Catholic teaching and to educate Catholics on the moral dimensions of public life, so that they may form their consciences in light of their faith." (Administrative Committee, US Bishops, *Faithful Citizenship: A Catholic Call to Political Responsibility*, 2003.)
- "We encourage all citizens, particularly Catholics, to embrace their citizenship not merely as a duty and privilege, but as an opportunity meaningfully to participate in building the culture of life. Every voice matters in the public forum. Every vote counts. Every act of responsible citizenship is an exercise of significant individual power. We must exercise that power in ways that defend human life, especially those of God's children who are unborn, disabled or otherwise vulnerable" (US Bishops, *Living the Gospel of Life*, 1998, n. 34).
