PARISH NOTES: MAKING ALL THINGS NEW

If we are to give our archbishop credit for grace working through his apostolic office, we should take his word as the Lord's when we consider the parish merger of St. Thomas and St. Joseph according to "Making All Things New." The process wasn't perfect and it's been difficult to implement; nor is it in anyway completed. I have been engaged in the undertaking with two different parishes, in three different iterations, but I don't envision it's fruition until well after my first term or even second term as pastor.

At the outset, the goal was to remake the parish in ways that inspire active parishioners to true discipleship and invite new parishioners to become part of the calling. A common ideal used in a number of the parish reform movements around the country is to move **from maintenance to mission**. Thus far, St. Thomas of Canterbury - St. Joseph Parish has begun a new way of catechizing our children and families; we are developing an outreach to our elderly and infirm parishioners that will keep us more connected to this important segment of our parish; we are thinking of ways to enhance the experience of prayer through our liturgy and other opportunities. (We will have a Lenten parish mission from March 13 to 15th, among other things.)

However, no parish - or organization - can survive all the change occurring in our world and in our church unless it gives high attention to its infrastructure. With so many challenges facing parish life today, like the lack of engagement in parish life by our young people, or the increasing secularization of our society, or the lack of available religious and clergy, it is vital that we think smartly about how we do what we do. In most parishes today, and admittedly in our own, an approach to infrastructure - that is, by organizing institutions and groups of people in a mindful way that best supports the mission of a parish - has only been notional. We do the things we've always done, because they were always done in that way. That can only lead to stagnation.

This past year, I hired Dennis Corcoran, a nationally known lay pastoral leader, to help us develop a parish infrastructure that works. With his help, we

have already formed a new Finance Council to ensure that all monies coming in and out of the parish are administered with regard to purpose and process. Our newly formed parish council will soon begin meeting regularly to help prioritize the current and future direction of St. Thomas - St. Joseph. Our parish staff will be charged with both stewarding and animating those initiatives.

Eventually, we hope the work of these parish leaders and the guidance they provide to the pastor will bring greater engagement with all our parishioners in the mission we share in Christ, and I ask all to pray that the Holy Spirit will guide us to make our parish truly new!
