## **RESOLUTIONS**

Besides the expected revelries, New Year's Day is famously about resolutions. While I would find it gratifying if the day - the Octave (eighth day) of Christmas - were more about honoring Mary, the Mother of God (though this year it is not a holy day of obligation), the almost ritual observance in making some kind of pledge each year to bring new purpose to our lives is hopeful nevertheless. We can hardly shrug off any eagerness to improve our health or our relationships with family and friends, or even our enemies. Sadly, resolutions are often quickly and almost as ritualistically forsaken.

I never make resolutions for myself on New Year's Day, and never have, perhaps because of a tendency from my adolescence to sloth when it comes to self-improvement. Yet since becoming a priest, I have found it necessary to make a resolution every day toward greater holiness. I would be miserable otherwise. Once a year resolutions don't seem enough. And while my success is spotty, I never give up trying!

There is a difference between the two kinds of resolutions and this may explain why the former Year's resolutions) are S0 abandoned. Our human nature (both personal and universal) is so injured by Original Sin (though forgiven in baptism) and individual sin that its weakness obscures the mind's grasp of what is possible and what is not. Everything we do is overshadowed by the "the veil that veils all people, the web that is woven over all the nations" (Isaiah 25) which is simply, death and its reality. suggests itself a certain futility to our endeavors and therefore, a futility in making resolutions. "Why stop smoking," we might hear an inner voice ask, "when I'm going to die anyway?" "What will minding Jesus's notion of who my neighbor is get me?" Death fundamentally limits our horizons, keeping us from seeing the eternal value present in us and in our world that was revealed by the Resurrection of Our Lord.

On the other hand, holiness is that striving for the kind of improvement or change in our lives that is eternal. Because holiness orients us toward the life of the saints in heaven, eternal happiness is its goal, and the goal makes the resolution worth keeping.

Of course, keeping that resolution will be as difficult as carrying out any other resolution. After all, resolutions are about sacrifice. (Jesus reminds us, "the spirit is willing, but the flesh is

weak.") Encouraged by Faith, however, we are assured the goal is real and possible and so find ourselves armed with a reason to keep fighting the good fight.

What kind of concrete resolutions, then, will lead me to holiness and the real happiness it promises?
